BUILDING A HEALTH SYSTEM FOR CENTRAL AFRICANS, BY CENTRAL AFRICANS

Each year I spend in the Central African Republic teaches me something new about what it means to build. Building here takes time and is rarely easy. But when something is built well here - when it is rooted deeply in the community it serves - it stands.

2025 was a year of building for Senitizo. We opened new projects and expanded others. We strengthened our operations. But more important than what we built is how we built it and who is doing the building.

From the very beginning, we have believed that the drivers of sustainable, quality health care in CAR must be Central Africans themselves. Today, as since day one, Senitizo is powered by a 100% Central African team - midwives, nurses, laboratory technicians, community health workers, administrators, cleaners, guards - women and men who wake up each morning committed to caring for their own communities. They are not temporary responders. They are not outsiders rotating through. They are neighbors serving neighbors. That is our foundation.

In 2025, that foundation continued to prove its strength. Our rural maternal health programs continued to grow, with more maternities opened and more women choosing to deliver safely in our clinics. We continued expanding our reach into remote and marginalized communities, including among indigenous Aka encampments tucked back among the rainforest. In Bangui, our HIV/AIDS and tuberculosis clinic continued to serve the most vulnerable people in the capital city with not only life-saving medication, but also dignity and respect which is the cornerstone of all our care.

Growth is exciting. New programs, new equipment, new partnerships - these are visible signs of progress. But I also see a quieter growth. I see it in the confidence of a young midwife assistant managing a complicated delivery under the supportive supervision of our midwife trainer. It is in the steady leadership of our clinic coordinators solving problems before I hear about them. It's our still young organization starting to grow strong roots that will nourish it far into the future.

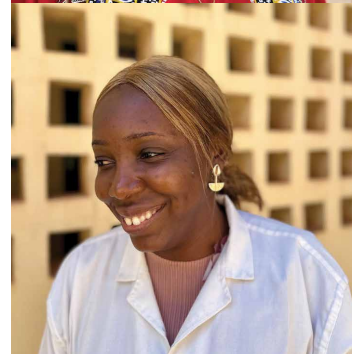

ABOUT US

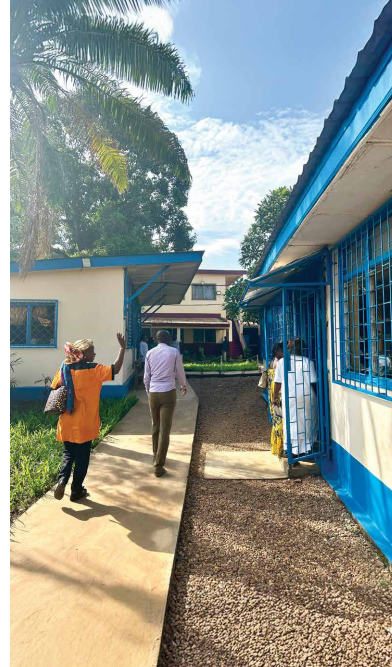
In 2017, Senitizo was founded to improve the lives of people living in the Central African Republic (CAR) by providing life-saving health services and sustainably strengthening the national health system.

Today, Senitizo operates in both rural and urban parts of the country. In Lobaye Prefecture, southwest of the capital city, Bangui, we manage a clinic providing quality health care to communities that previously had little access to medical services. In 2025, we expanded our maternal health program with an additional rural maternity ward, located ten miles south of our first clinic. In Bangui, we operate a large and growing clinic specializing in HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis, and malnutrition care, serving the most vulnerable urban populations.

In CAR, approximately 13% of children do not survive to the age of five. Yet with timely and appropriate medical care, the vast majority of these deaths are preventable. At our clinics, we provide a continuum of life-saving health services including preventative care, such as vaccines, as well as the diagnosis and treatment of the common but deadly diseases children face here in CAR. This past year, we treated just under 10,000 children between our two main facilities. Through our community outreach efforts, we also began expanding access to immunizations for “zero-dose” children - those who have never received a single vaccine - particularly in remote and marginalized communities in the rural areas we work.

To address the country’s extremely high maternal mortality rate - where approximately one in every 100 women dies during childbirth - our maternal health program includes four prenatal consultations complete with nutrition supplements, vaccinations, and routine testing; safe, facility-based deliveries; and postnatal follow-up for both mother and child via clinic and home visits. When complications arise during childbirth, we provide stabilization, ambulance referral, and essential supplies, including C-section kits, in coordination with the closest hospital to ensure that life-saving emergency obstetric care is accessible and free of charge.

At our urban clinic in Bangui, we treat 1,173 people living with HIV/AIDS and at any given time have roughly 350 tuberculosis patients undergoing treatment. These programs continue to expand as we work to strengthen long-term treatment adherence, improve patient outcomes, and integrate community and home-based support to these programs.

SPOTLIGHT ON EXPANDED MATERNAL HEALTH CARE

Over the past year, Senitizo has significantly expanded its maternal health program in the rural region of the country where we work. **Here, the lack of access to safe childbirth is a leading cause of death among women with most women being forced to deliver in their mudbrick homes without medical supervision.**

Expanding the reach of our maternal health services was immediately identified as a priority after opening the maternity ward at our first clinic in 2022. We noted that **many women were traveling long distances, in some cases fifteen miles by foot**, to attend prenatal consultations at our original clinic, but they were delivering at home. Once investigated, the reason for this was clear – when a woman would go into labor at home and not having access to any motorized vehicle, walking a long distance to get to the clinic was not an option. Since there is no cellular network in this part of the country, sending our ambulance out to the surrounding villages for a woman in labor was not reliable enough.



The solution was evident – we needed to expand our maternal health care program to additional structures and at the end of 2024, **the CAR government asked Senitizo to rehabilitate, equip, and support a dilapidated maternity ward ten miles south of our first clinic.** Thanks to the Baker Family Charitable Trust, what began as a single rural clinic has now begun to grow into a network of care, including two fully functioning maternity wards that provide prenatal consultations with essential supplements, vaccinations, and testing; safe and hygienic deliveries attended by skilled professionals; and postnatal follow-up care for both mothers and newborns. For complications, we provide emergency stabilization and coordinate ambulance referrals to Mbaiki District Hospital, supplying C-section kits to ensure that cost is never a barrier to receiving life-saving surgical care. This network will continue to grow with each passing year as we bring these services to other towns in the region.

In 2025, we welcomed 285 babies into the world at these rural facilities, each one representing a safe delivery that might have ended differently if complications had arisen at home. As the program continues to grow, **we expect this number to increase significantly**, alongside improvements in maternal and neonatal health outcomes across the region. Thanks to a new partnership with a Spanish non-profit, we will also begin installing low-cost, energy-efficient incubators in the maternities we support to care for babies born prematurely. Each step forward we take means keeping more mothers and infants happy and healthy.



Recently, Solange, a mother from a nearby village who had given birth to a baby girl at our new maternity at the end of last year, was at the facility for a postnatal visit. It was her second child, but her first baby was born at home. **When asked why she had come to the clinic to deliver her second baby, she broke into a big smile and said simply, “here, I knew her and I would be safe.”** It’s stories like Solange’s that illustrate how we’re building a future where no woman in CAR has to risk her life to give birth.



NEW PROJECTS IN 2026

Expanded Malnutrition Care for Children

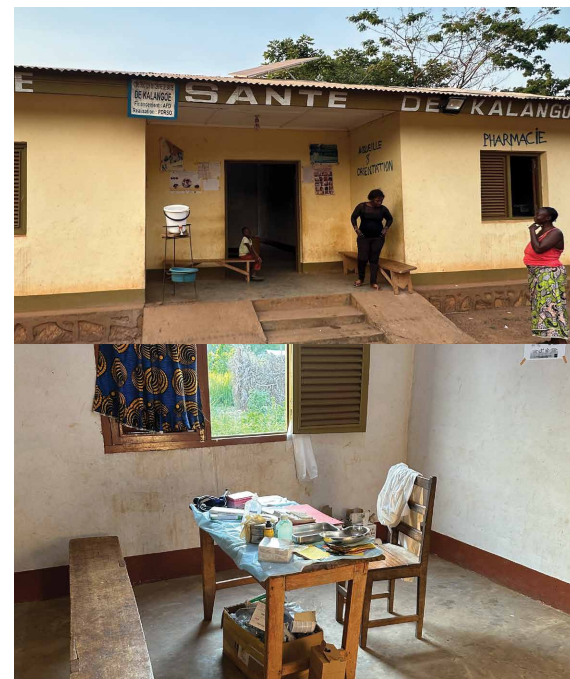
Since the start of 2025, improving the malnutrition program at our clinic in Bangui has been a priority. With roughly fifty children under the age of five receiving care at any given time, one of the biggest challenges has been securing fortified therapeutic foods for the children. Usually, these foods would be regularly available and given to us for free from various partners (such as UNICEF), but with recent disruptions, they haven't been available. In response, we will soon begin producing our own therapeutic foods (a vitamin and mineral enriched peanut butter mix and fortified infant formula) to serve our severely malnourished children. Through our own production of these foods, we will be able to ensure a consistent, high-quality supply of essential nutrition.

These therapeutic foods are complemented with close monitoring by our medical staff and free treatment of all illnesses to address both the immediate nutritional crisis as well as underlying health complications that can quickly become deadly for a weakened child.

Reactivating the Kalangoué Health Center

This summer, Senitizo will begin a project to breathe life into the Kalangoué Health Center. This clinic was built in 2021 on the same road that leads to our first rural clinic, but much closer to the capital city of Bangui (about an hour drive). It is a structurally sound, but currently non-functional, facility that lacks the essential equipment, medicines, staffing, and management systems needed to provide basic primary care.

This project will have three main components – provision of medicines and essential medical equipment, infrastructure improvements (such as safe medical waste disposal and improved sanitation/latrines), and most importantly, strengthening clinic management and supply systems with Senitizo staff to ensure long-term sustainability. Once operational, this primary health clinic will provide life-saving services to an immediate population of approximately 5,000 people, and eventually up to 20,000 from communities further afield for which this clinic will be the closest health facility.



Cervical Cancer and Obstetric Ultrasonography Medical Technology and Training Program

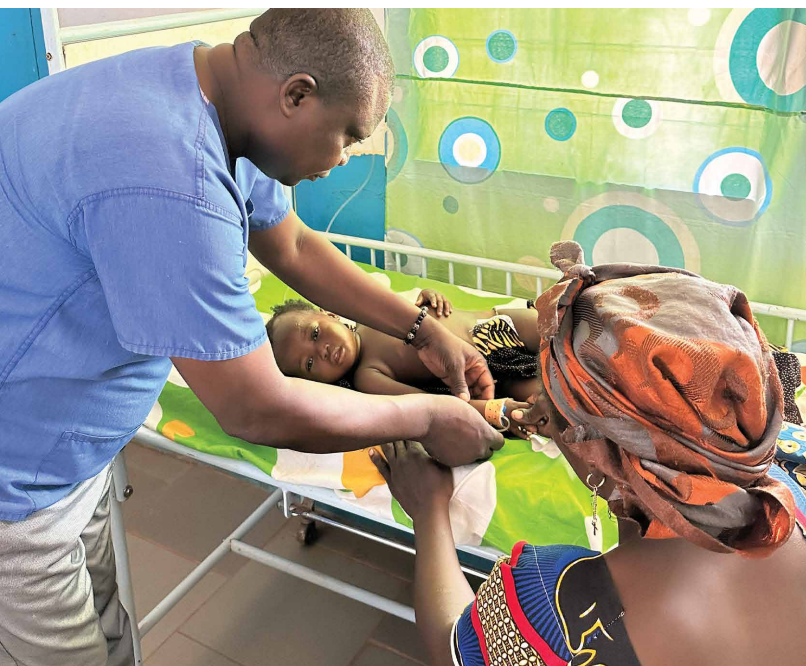
Senitizo is launching a new training program to strengthen diagnostic capacity of medical providers here in CAR through the introduction of portable, AI-enhanced technologies. In partnership with the Ministry of Health and key institutions in Bangui, this program will train doctors, midwives, and medical students to use handheld ultrasound devices and digital colposcopes to improve early diagnosis and treatment of obstetric complications and early-stage cervical cancer. The pairing of intensive training with the provision of this equipment will improve clinical decision-making as part of routine care, reduce preventable deaths among women and newborns, and equip a new generation of health professionals with the tools needed to deliver higher-quality, life-saving medical services. Much more to come on this program in our newsletters this year!

OUR FINANCIAL INFORMATION

We couldn't make the impact that we do without your generous support. In 2025, we raised over \$273,400 from individual donors, foundations, and corporations. Over 95% percent of our expenses went directly to our programming on the ground at our rural and urban clinics, with the other 5% percent going mostly to our operations support in CAR's capital city, Bangui. We pride ourselves on limiting fundraising and administration expenses in the U.S. to less than 2.5% of all expenses.

HOW DO WE USE YOUR DONATION?



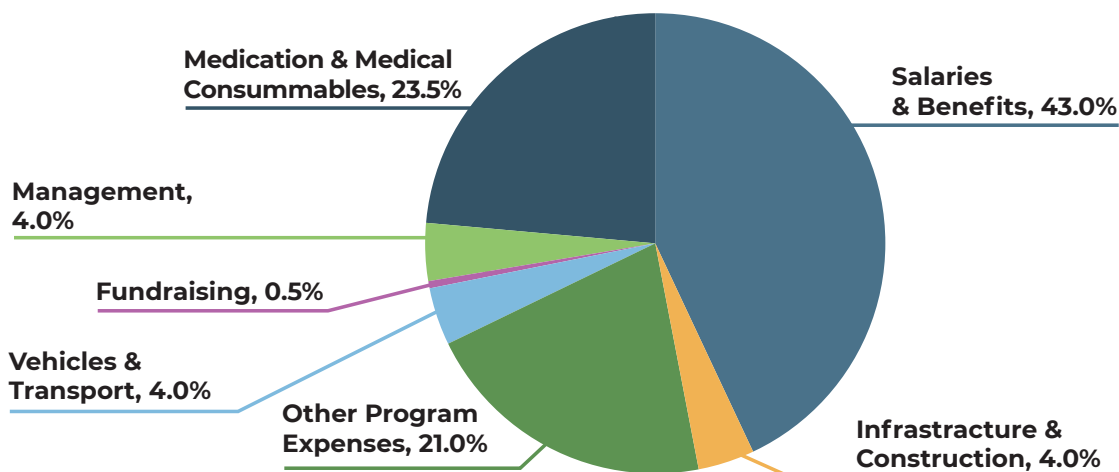
At the core of how we advance our mission at Senitzo is to make sure each dollar entrusted to us by our donors goes as far as possible in providing health care to those who need it most in CAR. When founding the organization, President and CEO, Ted Hooley, deliberately structured the organization to limit overhead expenses and maximize the amount of funding that goes directly to our programs.

Over 95% of our expenses go directly to our service delivery, with most of the remaining 5% of expenses going towards administration costs at our office in the capital city of Bangui. These administration costs include bank fees and different registration and legal expenses involved in working in the Central African Republic.

The majority (66.5%) of your donation goes towards two types of program expenses in particular - medications and medical consumables used at the clinic and salary expenses for our medical staff. While our medical staff salaries seem modest compared to the U.S., we provide competitive compensation which makes up 43% of our total expenses. We view these expenditures as an investment in the long-term development of the health sector, since our staff are all local health practitioners.

Each dollar goes a long way in providing healthcare in CAR. For example:

- The most common medications used to treat life-threatening conditions for children cost \$3 for a full course of treatment.
- We can provide the emergency transport, medical supplies, C-section operation, and subsequent hospital care for a woman suffering from an obstetric emergency for only \$100.
- The average monthly salary for one of our midwife or nurse assistants is \$250.
- Only \$1,000 covers a month of the other operating expenditures for our two clinics which include hygiene supplies (soap, disinfectants, personal protective equipment), fuel for our vehicles and well pumps, repairs and maintenance, and other clinic supplies.

- **Make a Qualified Charitable Distribution from your IRA account as part of your required minimum distribution.** At age 70 ½ you can begin to make Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) from your IRA account which are tax-deductible. At age 73, these QCDs will also count towards your required minimum distributions (RMDs) in addition to being tax-exempt. These distributions, also called charitable IRA rollovers, are a tax-efficient way to give, especially as part of your required minimum IRA distribution.

 - In 2025, we estimate that still over \$10,000 in employer matches of donations made to Senitizo were left on the table. While it does take a little bit of effort, just 10 minutes of your time can double the impact of your gift to Senitizo! We have Double the Donation software that will send email prompts that are linked to the necessary online process with your employer if your gift is eligible to be matched. If you are not eligible, you can still click to notify us that your employer doesn't match, and you will automatically stop receiving these emails.
